Going Forward and Giving Back



When we found out about our first child, Matthew's, hearing difference, we were shocked. As a family who have no history of hearing differences, it was hard for us to accept the news. Since Matthew has mild to moderate sensorineural hearing difference (not hearing the higher frequency sounds such as "s" "sh" "th" "f"), we decided to have him mainly focus on his speech while taking some ASL classes at five months old. He has been wearing hearing aids and we started attending sessions at Children's Hearing & Speech Centre until he showed more interest at around the age of 2½ years old to learn some sign language from a deaf teacher at Deaf Children's Society. Currently he uses mainly speech as his means of communication but knows some ASL signs including alphabets, numbers, and a variety of foods.

The Mah Family continued

Our second child, Joshua, was born premature at 26 weeks. Besides worrying whether he would survive due to critical illness, his hearing level was always at the back of my mind. Would he be like Matthew having some sort of hearing differences? We weren't able to find out until he was closer to his term/due date. The doctors ran genetic tests with bloodwork and, thankfully, found that he does not have the mutation of what Matthew has. That was a relief, until we had Joshua do a full Auditory Brainstem Response (ABR) assessment once he reached five months adjusted.

To our surprise, the results came back quite confusing. We were told by the audiologist that he has unilateral ANSD (auditory neuropathy spectrum disorder), a more rare type of hearing loss that needs a lot of research and understanding, unlike the type of hearing difference we were "used to." I researched and tried seeking for answers, but many things were up in the air, especially with the fact that he was a micro preemie and doctors had prepared us a list of possible 'abnormalities.' Knowing Joshua is very much deaf in one ear, we decided to join BC Family Hearing, as they support both speech and ASL. We thought this would be the best fit for Joshua to be exposed to both languages to give him different avenues in expressing himself. We are so grateful to have our SLP Stefanie guide us in this new journey of ANSD and to help Joshua with both speech and sign language.

Our biggest adjustment is probably having to narrate and talk about every action we are doing so our children can get as much language as possible. My husband and I are quieter and more introverted so we are definitely not talkers. Hoping to have the kids absorb as much language as possible, we took the time to read them at least 10 books a day (even if it's the same book) and joined music classes with lyrics so they could follow along. Now they love humming and following along to the songs!



BC Family Hearing Resource Society does an excellent job connecting people and creating community. We never felt alone in our hearing journey as there are many activities we could join and meet families including Bouncy Babies group, seasonal events/gatherings (pre-covid), and many virtual groups that we could join to have our kids feel included. I'm amazed how there are numerous events for families to be involved, including useful facebook groups for when we exhaust our research and are curious what other families have faced.

I've also been following social media accounts/people who are deaf and have been learning lots of single signs. Getting to read about their personal experiences also gave us great insight and understanding of what it means to be deaf and hard of hearing! Social media sure plays a big part in learning more about the hard of hearing and deaf culture.

From two tumultuous pregnancy and birth experiences, and coming from a skincare background, I had the opportunity to start a clean skincare line made for pregnant postpartum moms and babies (for the whole family!). I knew I wanted to somehow give back to the community, especially the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (DHH) community and the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) that have supported our family immensely. We launched Naetal Skincare this summer 2021, and collaborated on a project with Joy Kinna, a local artist whose child also has hearing differences, in giving back to the three early intervention organizations that support deaf and hard of hearing children and their families (BCFHRS, CHSCBC, and DCS).

Having both children with hearing differences has opened our eyes to a new community. We think it's so important to contribute in any way to the DHH community in order to maintain these services, events, groups, and resources available for families to connect and be inclusive.

All the sessions we have had with our SLP, ASL teacher, and virtual events have helped us so much in supporting our two children's language development.

It may be overwhelming learning your child has hearing differences, but at the same time it's a great opportunity to learn how to dedicate your time to help with your child's needs. I've learnt so much with helping our children's development through BCFHRC including many activity ideas, incorporating sign language while reading and so much more. It's really a blessing in disguise, as it gives me, as a parent, more patience towards my children with their special needs.



When we started with our ASL classes there was a set of introduction lessons which had picture examples of how to sign the word. These worked great for reminders throughout the week as we were incorporating sign into our daily routine. Eventually we started asking for

the signs for different words that were not part of the weekly lessons, but were ones we found ourselves using frequently and wanting to sign them. We realized that everyone in our ASL group had the video messaging app called Marco Polo and added our instructor to a group chat. At first, he would sign the new words we had learned that week that were not part of the lesson diagrams in a message to us after our class that week.

Now it's a way for us to set the time for our next class, ask on the fly what a certain sign is, share family

news, and just have signing conversation for fun and extra practice. We have loved using Marco Polo to help get over that awkwardness of learning a new language (especially a visual one) and feeling supported on this new journey for our family.

What was the purpose of Kindness Week?









