Starting a New Life in Canada Amid a Global Pandemic



Avina, Milad and Neda

Neda shares her journey to Canada with her husband, Milad, and their experiences raising their hard of hearing daughter, Avina.

When I was leaving the Auditory Brainstem Response (ABR) department of the hospital with my mum who had my one-month-old daughter (Avina) in her arms, in a vague silence I could hear my footsteps as if I was walking nowhere. When Avina was born in the hospital in Iran, we were asked for a second hearing checkup. A month later, after having done the ABR test, we were facing the reality of Avina's moderate to severe sensorineural hearing loss in both ears. This was the biggest shock for me and the whole family. All of a sudden, the bright future that any parent has in mind for his/her child was replaced with an ambiguous and challenging future for us.

Unfortunately, I was suffering from postpartum depression and this shocking news added to my sadness. Thank God that mine and my husbands' parents were so supportive in helping me work through this difficult time. Looking back, my advice to parents is to not be alone in your suffering; do not hesitate to seek professional help if it's needed. I sometimes wonder if those first few months would have been easier if I had reached out to a psychologist or psychiatrist sooner.

Over the coming months, more ABR tests gave us more accurate results. Avina then started wearing hearing aids and soon after began receiving early intervention services, at nine months old. When Avina was 11/2 years old, our immigration to Canada was approved. We arrived in Vancouver in March 2020 at the beginning of the Covid-19 outbreak and large lockdowns! We faced many challenges at that time when we had to stay at home: my husband was working and studying at the same time; we were learning a new language; there were delays in administrative work and health services. We were far from our families` supports but we were also unable to connect with

our new community.

the day. When Avina was two years old she became really sensitive to her ears being touched. She would scream if you tried to put the hearing aids in, and audiology appointments were really upsetting for her. Getting new earmolds seemed impossible, but the audiologist suggested us getting earmold impressions at the hospital under anesthetic, but unfortunately the effect of the drug went away during the procedure.

Looking back now, we feel that this strategy of repeatedly trying for new impressions wasn't the best for Avina and may have caused further trauma and sensitivities. In the end, rather than getting new earmold impressions, what worked for Avina was her audiologist adapting her old earmolds as a temporary solution until Avina was able to tolerate and cooperate with earmold impressions. We're happy to say that she's now at that stage again.

We worried about psychological damage and anxiety around the hearing aids, but we also knew how important these early years were for auditory, speech, and language development. Over the next nine months, we could only persuade her to wear hearing aids with small prizes and exciting games, but it was still a struggle. After a lot of close consultation with her audiologist, Sonia, we got a new earmold with softer material

and a shorter canal length. This made it more comfortable for Avina but she was resistant to putting them on.

Her everyday cries caused us a lot of suffering and at the height of our disappointment we were asking ourselves whether this shadow of sadness would leave our home or not. And YES, "The end of black night is brightness."

Finally, her monkey toy one day turned into a doctor monkey who

was responsible for putting on her hearing aids on and she really liked this game!

Free medical services and the unwavering supports from BC Family Hearing Resource Centre (BCFHRC) were super effective in paving the way for us. We were so lucky to have Sonia (her first audiologist) and Valerie Marshall (Avina`s speech-language pathologist) beside us. Their patience and kindness in calming us and helping Avina really helped us in this challenging journey. Thank you very, very much Valerie and Sonia!

Avina loves books and she understands her mother language (Farsi) very well and can speak it fluently. She started going to

BCFHRC Day Care last September for two days a week, so now she is learning English and American Sign language (ASL). She absolutely loves the daycare and her teachers. We are also participating in ASL monthly Zoom classes, lead by Karen Jackson. ASL has provided a new way for us to communicate together. After Covid

restrictions were reduced, BCFHRC started hosting a variety of exciting events again and we have participated as much as we can. It has been great for Avina to finally get to play with more children and meet others who also wear hearing aids.

Now, Avina is happily using her hearing aids everyday for (almost) the whole day. Our journey to this point over the last four years has been challenging. However, awareness, getting closer with our family, and patience are some of the invaluable gifts this journey has also given us. Avina's smiles and sweet language is like heaven for me and my husband. We are so thankful to experience these sweet moments, and we

are hoping to be able to give her self-confidence, love, and happiness.

I always remind myself that patience and awareness can transfer the darkness of any challenge to brightness. This brightness is the light that we feel in our heart, not necessarily what we expect to happen in the world. We need to just do what we can do with love and patience, and let the universe show us the results.


From Junette:
